Tracheostomy Nursing Care and Management

Tracheostomy is a surgical procedure in which an opening is done into the trachea to prevent or relieve airway obstruction and/or to serve as access for suctioning and for mechanical ventilation and other modes of oxygen delivery (tracheostomy collar, T-piece).. A tracheostomy can facilitate weaning from mechanical ventilation by reducing dead space and lowering airway resistance.
