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### Verbal Behavior

Verbal Behavior is a 1957 book by psychologist B. F. Skinner, in which he describes what he calls verbal behavior, or what was traditionally called linguistics.

Verbal Behavior, also known as VB, is a method of teaching language that focuses on the idea that a meaning of a word is found in their functions. The term was coined by B.F. Skinner. To teach a child with language delays a meaning of a word, one must first teach its function.

Defining the Term Verbal Behavior therapy uses similar concepts to Applied Behavioral Analysis. It is a method of teaching communication to people who have not yet acquired language using operant conditioning. It consists of four "contingencies": Motivational Operation, Discriminating Stimulus, Response and Reinforcement.

Verbal Behavior (VB) therapy teaches communication and language. It is based on the principles of Applied Behavior Analysis and the theories of behaviorist B.F. Skinner. This approach encourages people with autism to learn language by connecting words with their purposes. The student learns that words can help them get desired objects or results.

Verbal Behaviors is a communication theory that proposes that language, like any other observable action, is a learned behavior that can be acquired, developed, and sustained through the application of behavioral strategies, (prompting, reinforcing, planned ignoring, etc.).

Verbal Behavior The simplest form of verbal behavior, present in even the very young child, is similar in its dynamic function to the behavior of a pigeon pecking a key or a rat pressing a bar. The similarity of the two cases is more apparent if a student is substituted for the pellet delivery mechanism in the case of the pigeon.

In 1957, B. F. Skinner wrote a book called Verbal Behavior, in which he introduced a controversial idea – that language is behavior! He used the term “verbal behavior” instead of “language” to make this point very clear.

### What is VB (Verbal Behavior)? Is it different from ABA ...

At the core of Skinner’s functional analysis of verbal behavior is the distinction among the mand, tact, and intraverbal. These three types of verbal behavior are traditionally all classified as “expressive language.” Skinner suggests that this classification masks important distinctions among functionally independent types of language.
